Insects love Liatris aspera, which blooms later than other gayfeathers. Pollinators include butterflies, skippers, and long-tongued bees including honeybees, bumblebees, Little Carpenter bees, Miner bees, and Leaf-Cutting bees. Butterfly visitors include Monarchs, Painted Ladies, Black Swallowtails, and Sulfurs and Green Metallic bees and other Halictine bees are attracted as is the rare *Schinia florida* (Glorious Flower Moth).

It's fun to watch the more humid air above ponds and rivers become visible in the form of wispy fog that quickly burns off as the sun rises higher. If there is no

wind, you can sometimes see steam devils, which like dust devils are caused by warming air rising in a vortex that is made visible in this case by fog.

Recent rains have boosted annual and perennial sunflowers, goldenrods, euphorbia corollata, gentian, tick trefoil, fall thistles boneset, snakeweed, and early asters can't be far behind.
Ragweed is pollinating, much to the chagrin of folks with pollen

allergies. It's a great time to visit a prairie. Some opportunities for seeing/planting native habitat continue, with Audubon walks in Topeka at McDonald Field/Shunga Trail, and Lawrence Burcham Park, both 8-10am on Saturday, Wakarusa Riverbank restoration at Eudora Boat Ramp

Parking lot 9-11am on Saturday, or Hidden Valley Work Day/Nature Walks in Lawrence on Saturday 9-noon, and Grassland Heritage Foundation is having a native plant sale at

Cottin's Hardware parking lot on Thursday 4-6:30pm. S Cicadas sing when it's above 75; grasshoppers sing into the evening, joined by katydids, crickets, nighthawks and treefrogs,

keeping the nights alive with their wild songs. We'll lose another 16 minutes of daylight this week!
