- Getting an itch for spring planting? Jayhawk Audubon is providing a zoom presentation about using native plants for landscaping your yard Monday, March 28, 7-9pm: www.jayhawkaudubon.org/events has the details--it's free and will share lots of resources/ideas.
- Turkey vultures have returned across most of the state: look for groups plying the sky, taking advantage of warmer temperatures to ride the thermals, catching the scent of carcasses that have accumulated in the winter while they were vacationing in Latin America all the way down to Venezuela.
- Prairie burning has begun in earnest across the state. Used as a management tool to kill off woody plant invasion and stimulate new grass growth, there is an increasing number of summer burns because of their effectiveness in killing invasive weeds and also to mimic fire ecology that is year-round.
- Woodland ephemerals (wildflowers) continue to be a little slow to bloom due to the dry and recently cool conditions, with peak conditions looking to be in the first half of April--with morels following.
- Other things to look for with rain and warmer temps: pussytoes and verbena blossoms, henbit turning crop fields purple, spider gossamer visible in grasses and twigs, moths, ladybugs, box elder beetles, turtles emerging, plus wood rats, foxes and muskrats all bearing young around now.
