This probably cues pollinators which flowers to pay attention to.

- We are in the thick of a bumper hackberry butterfly season, found by the tens of thousands on country gravel and dirt roads, under mulberry trees and drawn to animal scat. They are harmless and will land on your arms if you let them.
- Just a few wildflowers blooming right now: daisy fleabane, sensitivebrier, butterfly and other milkweeds, wild indigo, wild alfalfa, blackeyed susans, penstemon, yarrow, deptford pink, prairie phlox, Indian plantain, echinacea, delphinium, corepopsis, evening primrose and many, many more.
- With a hot, dry week ahead, expect test cuttings of wheat in southern counties as Kansas wheat harvest gets underway, moving north as the fields ripen and dry out. But the bane of wheat farmers, scattered severe storms with hail, are forecast mid-week, so keep your fingers crossed!
- Time to check those blackberry, raspberry, gooseberry currant, and wild plum thickets, as wild strawberries are gone, mulberries are finishing up and elderberries and grapes are not yet ready. Don't forget about the ticks and chiggers!
- If the day is sunny without wind, listen next to a corn field to see if you can hear it growing. Around sunset, watch for deer, blue herons, bats, bobcats and foxes. Afer dark, enjoy lightning bugs, nighthawks, whippoorwills, bullfrogs and snakes crossing the road after dark.
