Prairie wildflowers to check out this week include gayfeather, stiff sunflower, compassplant and Rudbeckia subtomentosa, Euphorbia corollata, wild petunia and showy partridge pea along with many others. Ashy sunflowers are starting to bloom, and goldenrods are increasing. Tallgrass prairie grasses continue to shoot up their tall seedheads and sumac berries are ripe.

All of the state but parts of northeast and north central Kansas are in various stages of drought, with little relief expected for the rest of the month and the Climate Prediction Center predicts above normal temperatures and below avgerage precipitation thru October.

Poison ivy is putting out its berries, while a much better liked vine, wild grapes, are growing fruit that will be ripe for eating toward the end of this month. Elderberries are ripening as we speak, as are inedible (by humans) dogwood fruit.

The full moon will make it difficult to see the Perseid meteor shower which peaks Aug. 11, but look for owls and other wildlife taking advantage of the moonlit nights and enjoy the nighthawks diving over your downtown to pick off bugs after dark. The shortening days (we lose 15 minutes of daylight this week) should trigger redwinged blackbirds to start to gather in flocks in area wetlands, seen around sunrise and sunset.
