There's a reason for so many butterflies this time of year, and plentiful wildflowers are it. Among the profusion of species currently blooming are mare's tail, blue gentians, lady's tresses, boneset, various goldenrods and annual/perennial sunflowers, swamp milkweed, slender mountain mint, euphorbia corollata, and snow-on-the-mountain. One particularly good butterfly identification guide can be found at https://www.discoverlife.org and then typing in "butterfly." It not only allows you to hone in on your butterfly quickly, but it also teaches you about other species along the way.

Deer will be increasing their presence as September continues; buck antlers are growing for mating season late October/November, and young fawns are becoming more adventurous as they grow larger every day.

Bird migrations are beginning with flocks of blackbirds gathering and hummingbirds passing through. Fall warblers will soon arrive, migratory dragonflies are assembling, and it is still a good time to look for walking sticks and praying mantises.

Even though many people are justifiably wary of wasps, there are literally hundreds of species in Kansas, and many of them play very beneficial roles in area ecosystems due to their predatory behavior and bizarre ways of using other animals to propagate through parasitism.
