Frosty mornings are more apparent in grasslands than in the woods and where the sun strikes first the frost melts quickly away in a patchwork of sun and shade. Cold or not, squirrels can be heard scurring about in woodland leaves, while woodpeckers still flit from dead tree to dead tree, looking for bugs to eat and sparrows hang out in grasses and cattails, flitting away when you get close.

There's a slim chance that the Leonid meteor shower, visible after midnight Thursday/Friday morning, will have some bursts of up to 300 meteors/hour. Good luck!

Many mammals will be drifting into hibernation later this month or next. There are two kinds of hibernation: raccoons, bears and many other mammals become very lethargic and sleep a lot, retaining a normal body temperature, while true hibernators like ground squirrels, some mice and bats, drop their core temperatures to around 39 degrees F. Insects can get even colder due to producing antifreeze and going into a state of suspended animation called diapause, or lay eggs and larvae that can survive even sub-zero temperatures.

Mushrooms can be found through the winter, and thanks to some rain, you may be able to find puffballs, pleurotis/oyster, shelf and jelly mushrooms. Also, check out the New Guide to Kansas Mushrooms--it's fantastic!
