- Almost the entire state has seen rain this past week. After some cooler weather and breezy north winds, the heat will be returning, so see if you can see an increase in insect/tree frog singing later this week. Spider webs will be returning in increasing in numbers with increasing warmth, too.
- Alas, with moisture and increased insects, chiggers are back in the eastern part of the state, and seed ticks, some almost too small to see, are multiplying in many areas. Take a shower and check yourself carefully after a walk in the fields and woods.
- Notice a number of bird flocks may be taking advantage of the free ride on the north winds, including wending rivers of blackbirds. Many birds have lost their colorful feathers through molting and some have also begun southern migration in small groups as the beginning of migratory bird season across the state has begun.
- This has been a nice August for observing wildflowers, which continue to bloom including evening primrose, whorled milkweed, wild petunia, ashy, maximillian and sawtooth sunflowers, slender mountain mint, boneset and joepye weed, sweet coneflower, rosinweed, and gayfeathers.
- This is a great time to observe some pretty special insects: butterflies. One of the more common groups of butterflies this time of year are called skippers: there are many species and it's fun to try to sort them out using your favorite app.
