S Deer activity continues to increase, with lots of tracks to try and follow after it rains this week. Raccoons seem to be on

the move--watch out for them when driving at night. S Dry sunflower stalks and prairie grasses are good places to look for a variety of sparrows. Wetlands are good places to look

for shorebirds and migrating redbird/grackle flocks; and reservoirs hold many seagulls, some eagles, geese and ducks.

Most leaves are still on trees in northeast Kansas, but leaves are beginning to fall. Most years the leaves clear off the trees during the first week of November, so expect the number of leaves letting go of the branches to increase considerably with the rains this week. It can make for a wonderful walk!
In addition to seed collecting, this is a good time to use what nature provides to decorate. Asters typically survive the first frosts, while goldenrod is turning ghostly white just in time for Halloween. Bittersweet berries are opening up and can be collected for adorning your home for the holidays. Cedar boughs especially those thick with the blue berries can be cut and replaced whenever they dry out.
