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For some reason young oaks tend to turn redder than fully grown oaks this time of year, as is evidenced by this particularly red young red oak tree. Some oaks do not develop what botanists call an abcissa layer between the twig and the leaf, meaning that they will hold onto their leaves all through the winter. This week, many other trees will lose their leaves.

Remember to move your clocks back an hour Saturday night/Sunday morning: we are returning to Central Standard Time as we've lost over 3 hours of sunlight since the summer solstice, on our way to the winter solstice when we only will

have slightly over 9 hours of daylight. There may be a few asters and an occasional sunflower still blooming. protected from the freezes this week--look for them on your autumn walks. If it's daytime, watch them for a while and you might also see an insect looking for one last meal.

In your home you might also see ladybugs huddling up in the corners of ceilings, and there may be a few bunches of box elder beetles gathering on the sunny south side of buildings, or perhaps a late season ruddy grasshopper or the last calls of a

late season cricket. Look for gossamer in the sky from migrating spiders riding a north wind if it's sunny out.
Deer mating season is here, and you can find spots in the woods where bucks have cleared the vegetation from the ground by pawing or "rutting" as part of their mating ritual.
With leaf fall comes improved bird visibility and if you have/ put up a bird feeder, you will have a parade of winter bird
