It's still a grand week for taking a walk, even though leaf color was subdued by the recent drought and subfreezing temperatures. Oak woodlands are still raining leaves, and don't park under an osage orange tree if you don't want a cracked

windshield--mine just broke in two places!
Almost all flowers are done blooming for the year, but you might be lucky enough to see a late blooming aster or two. It's still a great time to collect seeds from wildflowers, acorns, walnuts, pecans, hickory nuts, and grass seed if you want to

spread native plants around in your neighborhood. Flocks of overwintering crows are back and hawks are common, perched on poles, in trees and fence posts, looking for a meal. There are still plenty of ducks and shorebirds at area reservoirs; check those areas to see what else you can

spot. Sparrows can be spotted in brush and grasses.
Deer mating season continues, as does archery hunting season, so look for evidence of the deer "ruts" where bucks have cleared the vegetation from the ground by pawing as part of their mating ritual. Also dress in bright colors and act

"human" so hunters don't mistake you for a deer! [If you would like to enjoy a fall hike with others, consider joining the Kansas Land Trust in a free walk this Sunday at 10am-noon at the Lawrence Nature Park, a beautiful woodland protected by a conservation easement located north of 6th Street and Folks Road.
