 - the amount of time the USD board of education estimates it will take for all students to achieve proficiency above level 2 for grade level academic expectations on the state assessments if such budget actions are implemented.









K.S.A. 72-1163 (SS HB 2567)

Building Needs Assessment and State Assessment Review

- The USD board of education shall conduct and publish a needs assessment and state assessment review to the USD website; a copy of both should be kept on file at the USD administrative offices.
- In the minutes of the meeting at which the USD board of education approves its annual budget, the following shall also be included:
 - that the needs assessment was provided to the USD board of education,
 - that the needs assessment was evaluated by the USD board of education,
 - how the USD board of education used the needs assessment in the approval of the USD budget.





Leadership at each attendance center should evaluate their needs assessment through usual district procedures (e.g. **Teacher Leadership Teams, Site Councils, Building Leadership Teams, Professional Learning Communities) and submit to** district leadership for consideration.



ELA % by Subgroup




Math % by Subgroup






District Science % by Subgroup


USD 497 Mission


Academic Achievement: Reading

Academic Achievement: Mathematics


By the end of the 2025-26 school year, 75% of students in grades K-2 will score as low-risk or on-track on the Spring FastBridge aMath or earlyMath assessment.

By the end of the 2025-26 school year, the number of students in grades 3-8 and entry level High School math courses scoring at level 3 and 4 on KAP Math Assessment will increase by 10% each school year.





USD 497 KAP Mathematics Assessment










Fastbridge Spring EarlyMath and aMath

Post-Secondary Effectiveness


By the end of 2025-26, Lawrence Public Schools will increase to 54% post secondary effectiveness.







D0497 Lawrence - District Aggregate



Graduation Rate: The 4-year adjusted cohort graduation rate is the number of students who graduate in four years with a regular high school diploma divided by the number of students who entered high school as 9th graders four years earlier (adjusting for transfers in and out).

Success Rate: A student must meet one of the four following outcomes within two years of High School graduation.

- 1. Student earned an Industry Recognized Certification while in High School
- 2. Student earned a Postsecondary Certificate
- 3. Student earned a Postsecondary Degree
- 4. Student enrolled in Postsecondary in both the first and second year following High School graduation

Effective Rate: The calculated Graduation Rate multiplied by the calculated Success Rate.

Structured Literacy

We provide literacy instruction aligned to the science of reading and assure teachers and administrators are well-trained and knowledgeable in the elements and implementation of structured literacy.

Standards Alignment

We align lessons, instruction, and materials to Kansas standards and clearly identify what students must know and be able to do. This includes interpersonal, intrapersonal, and cognitive skills in pre-K-12.

Balanced Assessment

We assess students for risk and standards and use data to adjust instruction. We have a deep understanding of the purpose of each assessment and how to use the data to raise achievement.

Quality Instruction

We have a culture of high expectations in our classrooms and provide each student access to grade level standards and content though high-quality instructional materials.
