In addition to various species of sunflowers, look for blooming/on the verge of blooming thistles, goldenrods, gentians and bonesets. Spiranthes, flowering spurge and gayfeathers continue to bloom and in the woods, snakeroot is gettomg ready to bloom. Sticktites, hedge parsley and other sticky seeds abound, and I've seen some ragweed beginning to pollinate: allergy sufferers beware!

Many birds are in the area, including shorebirds, hummingbirds, turkey vultures, ducks, nighthawks, and myriad other species, some of which are gathering in flocks. So many insects and seed-producing plants have kept area birds happy.

What is that daytime song you are hearing that is not a bird or frog? Probably an insect, including a variety of cicada species. Check out which sound belongs to which insect here: http://songsofinsects.com/thumbnail-guide-to-species

With the full moon this week, it's a good time to see animals who use the extra light to get around. A slow drive on quiet country roads can be a good way to see mammals, and

reptiles who prefer cooler nights over days to get around. And roll down your window to hear the katydids, tree frogs and other night singers, which at times can be almost deafening.

There are many hummingbirds who have arrived in the area, and it's not too late to put out a feeder to attract some.
