The fall planting season takes many forms. Seeds drop from plants, sometimes carried by the wind long distances, and are covered by leaves, keeping them viable and providing compost for spring sprouting. Other seeds are buried by animals or enveloped in tasty flesh for animals to eat and after passing through their digestive systems, are deposited with fertilizer far away from the mother plant.

Many goldenrod species continue to provide late nectar sources for pollinators, who in turn fertilize the flowers that will mature into seeds for another year. Other yellow flowers join them including perennial and annual sunflowers, silphiums, bidens, jerusalem artichokes, along with purple and white asters, white bonesets, and lingering blue sage and gentians.

Monarch butterfly migration seems to be smaller this year, but with the passage of the cold front, now is a good time to see a potential increase in numbers, riding the tailwind. Look also for turkey vulture kettles, dragonflies, spiders using their gossamer, blackbirds, warblers and many other species using the favorable winds to head south.
