- The moon is a waxing slender crescent setting a little after 9pm, making conditions perfect conditions on Friday in the morning before dawn, for watching the Quadrantid meteor shower. It has a very short peak, producing as many as 100 meteors an hour--unfortunately peaking after daylight.
- Winter can be a good time to identify trees, since each species not only has unique leaves, they also have different bark, leaf scars, bud locations and other characteristics that distinguish them from other tree and shrub species. Online

<u>https://feralforaging.com/fundamentals-of-winter-tree-identification/</u> is great for bud ID; I find looking at the leaves on the ground under a tree are a pretty easy guide, too.

- Flocks of robins are combing the woods, eating honeysuckle berries and spreading the invasive bush. Other birds are picking over hackberry trees for their berries, as well as sunflower and other forb seedheads. Squirrels are eating osage orange seeds and light green hedge apple fragments lay under many of the trees.
- Pack rat nests are full of acorns and other seeds so they can survive the winter on what they've stockpiled. Their nests not only can contain more than one generation of packrats; they can be the winter home for rabbits, mice, insects, spiders and shrews as well.
