- The moon waxing toward full this week is called both Frost on the Inside of the Lodge Moon and Moon Stands Alone Moon by the Osage Indians, partly because unlike the sun, whose path across the sky is low in the south, the moon's path is far north, almost overhead in the sky.
- Many insects, reptiles, amphibians and small mammals find refuge from the cold by digging into the ground. On January 5, when the air temperature was 15 degrees Fahrenheit, the soil temp 2" down was 37°, 46° at 20 inches, and 53° at 40 inches below the surface north of Lawrence. The layer of snow

insulates the ground, plants and soil life from the extreme cold that is passing through this week.

- The north windblown snow is drifting into very cool shapes on the south side of fences and south facing road cuts. This is a real blessing for south slopes which dry out more in the summer so can use the extra moisture this time of year.
- Mammal activities: coyote, opossum and fox mating, squirrel foraging, look for fallen deer antlers.
