February the Light of Day Returns Moon. Nature begins to respond to the increased light in the following ways: tree cavity dwelling birds are beginning to leave multi-species winter flocks

to stake out their territories, small mammals are beginning their mating season, green stink bugs can be seen looking for food on warmer days, spider gossamer shows up on leafless twigs as they start wandering, dogwood twigs turn reddish and willows turn yellowish as their sap rises, and look for buds on

the tops of elms and maples begin to swell, even bloom.
 In the wetlands along the Wakarusa south of Lawrence as well as other wetlands across the state, now is a great time to see many species of birds including pelicans, ducks, hawks, eagles, gulls, doves, owls, kingfishers, woodpeckers, crows, meadowlarks, and winter songbirds.
