- The Osage call this moon "Just Doing That Moon" because of the changeability of the weather this time of year, which ranges from sunny warmth to cold bluster and snow. This year, the name could also refer to the changes in the moon itself: there's a total lunar eclipse Thursday night/Friday morning, and with mostly clear skies predicted, it's worth checking out--if you are a night owl! The eclipse begins at 12:09am, becoming total between 1:26am and 2:31am, then becoming whole again by 3:47am. I plan to set my alarm for a couple times leading up to and during totality--the moon turns a beautiful shade of red.
- Listen for the sounds of boreal forest frogs in wet areas and ponds (check out how it sounds at the Kansas Herpetofaunal Atlas online) and after dark, listen for the "peent" of the American woodcock (listen at the allaboutbirds.org website).
- After/during a rain, salamanders are on the move this time of year. Keep your eyes open for early mushrooms: pleurotis/oyster mushrooms and puffballs will lead the way for next month's prize: the morel.
- The middle of March marks the northward migration of thousands and thousands of sandhill cranes (and the small flock of whooping cranes) across Kansas through places like Quivira National Wildlife Refuge on their way to the Platte River in Nebraska. People from all over the world come to see it.
