Insects are increasingly busy, as mud daubers, paper and wood wasps and carpenter bees look for good places to build, moths look for mates, and gnats cluster into flying clouds, typically over a white object in a field of green, trying to attract a mate. Look for ants on peony buds, lapping up nectar they love and protect the plant from aphids and others pests. Ticks and grasshoppers are out, too, and look for lightning bugs!

If you are visiting a native woodland, look for jack-in-thepulpit, late blooming May apples, woodland phlox, buckeye, papaw, gooseberry blossoms & Kentucky coffee tree flowers.

If you are visiting a native prairie, look for prairie violets, wood betony, puccoon, wild indigo, verbena, stargrass, oxalis, New Jersey tea, spring beauty and hoary puccoon.

There are many wild edible plants this time of year, including nettles, poke, mustard garlic, wild onions, lambsquarter, watercress, chickweed, plantain, and, yes, dandelion.

Most mammals, birds, reptiles and amphibians are in some stage of birthing, egg laying or raising young right now. Roadkills this time of year are often mothers who have gone foraging and deer killed in May and June can exceed the number of deer killed in November during rutting season, so drive carefully in coming weeks.

Watch the crescent moon grow bigger each day this week.
