If you see a rattlesnakemaster blooming, smell it: it's like smelling a jar of honey. Other flowers blooming include blazing star, compassplant, whorled milkweed, deptford pink, a host of sunflowers including sweet, stiff, ashy, and jerusalem artichoke sunflowers, slender mountain mint, prairie petunia, showy partridge pea, and gray coneflower.

Katydids continue to fill the night with their song and crickets and lightning bugs continue although the heat and dryness will be hard on the lightning bug populations. Praying mantids and walking sticks are out too, and cicadas start to sing when the temperature warms above 83 degrees Fahrenheit.

Teasel's cocklebur-like seedheads are filling up with little white flowers right now in eastern Kansas. This tall, prickly plant from Eurasia is invasive and spreading quickly along roadsides and into pastures and really should be eliminated

Foxtail, an annual grass has formed its bushy seed heads in disturbed areas. Look for its light green foliage and soft sixinch long tops that droop over like old fashioned fireworks. Prairie warm season grasses are sending up their seedheads. Most hay has been baled, corn has tassled and soybeans
