Believe it or not, these bugs are the same species: the two mating adult green stink bugs on the right looked like the round striped bug on the left when they were in the nymph stage. The nymph stink bug is feeding on the triangular New Jersey Tea seeds here, and the adults will suck juices from developing soybeans, tomatoes, peaches and the like, disfiguring them. But the little tachinid fly lays its eggs on the green bug eggs, parasitizing and eventually killing it.

- Fall prairie wildflower season continues, with various blazing star/liatris, ironweed, compassplant, rattelsnakemaster, black eyed susan, prairie petunia, ashy and other perennial sunflowers, Euphorbia corollata, and whorled milkweed blooming, and azure/blue sage and the goldenrods beginning their blossoms.
- Now is a good time to collect seeds from echinacea, sensitivebrier, wild indigo and prairie clover, as big bluestem and sideoats grama have been putting out their seedheads, with little bluestem, indiangrass and switchgrass close behind, making it harder to walk across prairies.
- Katydids, crickets and treefrogs, spiders, lightning bugs and moths continue to dominate the nights, while dragonflies, grasshoppers and beetles are easy to find in daylight. Robber flies are also out and if you think you see a really big dragonfly, look again; praying mantises are out and fly too.
 - Hedge parsley and tick trefoil seeds have matured into pervasive "sticktites" that get in dog fur, socks and pants.
- Wetlands, ponds, creeks, rivers and reservoirs around where you live are full of life this time of year, ranging from duckweed, algae, lotuses, cattails, a variety of frogs, snakes, fish, dragonflies, darners, and, of course, mosquitoes. Check out this 24-7 center of activity.
