- Conditions will be perfect, weather permitting, for watching the Geminid meteor shower the night of Dec. 13-14, especially after midnight. With very little moonlight, the dark skies could display up to 120 meteors an hour: the best of the year. Just find a dark sky away from lights, a warm place to lay/sit on a reclining lawn chair, a cup of hot drink, a friend and a whole list of wishes to make each time you see a shooting star!
- In addition to cool winter plants, this is also a good time to see evidence of animal activities on your walks. Besides animal tracks, look for rabbit and deer nibbles on last year's new growth twigs, scraped bark from bucks rubbing their antlers, dismantled nuts and hedgeballs from hungry squirrels, feather and fur piles from raptor/owl/coyote catches, piles of sticks (pack rat) or leaves (squirrel nests) and nibbled off dry grass stalks that are made into rodent nests.
- Winter bird flocks are busy at area bird feeders this time of year; be sure to keep them clean and well stocked. The first Christmas Bird Count in Kansas is on December 12 at Kanopolis. They take place all over the state, so check https://ksbirds.org/kos/2025CBC.htm to find a group near you and consider contacting to join in--they go into January.
- Sedar (actually juniper) boughs with berries make a fragrant and attractive decoration to festoon a mantle or window sill.
