§ This is a great time to start thinking about starting seed flats of garden plants--the perfect time to check out the Kaw Valley Seed Fair at the Douglas County Fairgrounds this Saturday 9am-2pm. Come buy plants and seeds, or partake in the free seed exchange: bring some to share, take some freebies home. In addition to plants there are other supplies, workshops and good food to boot.

§ This is a good time to clean out bluebird boxes as the birds will soon be inspecting homes for the spring to lay their eggs. Listen in the morning for mating songs of several songbirds -- see if you can pick out cardinals, chickadees, phoebes and various owls.

§ This month's moon Osage name is Light of Day Returns Moon, and true to form, this week gains 14 minutes of sunlight and some songbirds are starting to stake out their territories by singing in the morning and evening. See if you can identify them by their songs before you see them.

§ With warming temperatures, don't be surprised if you see a few moths come out after dark as they are some of the first insects to take a chance. I've already seen lady bugs, box elder beetles and green stink bugs stirring in recent sunny days, and you gossamer in the brush is a sign that some spiders are becoming active. Start checking your dogs for ticks....
